I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will;


put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you, or laid aside for you,

Note From the Superintendent

News From Canada

There will be no more quizzes for the moment. I will just let my brain cells reorientate. However, my daughter Jayne, who lives in Canada, has offered to write a diary of their farming life in Ontario, which we thought might be of interest to our readers. This first one is an introduction, then hopefully over the next few months, we will learn more about the ups and downs of farming life over the pond.

Here we go-----

Every Sunday evening, pretty much without fail, Dad and I can be found curled up, cup of tea in hand, putting the world to rights. Him at 6pm, after the News, me at 1pm after lunch. We discuss everything that has gone on in our lives, the happy, the sad, the crazy and the downright bizarre! We make a point however, to try and stay off politics and to always end the conversation on a happy note!

A few weeks ago he started the conversation with, "I've got a favour to ask!" "Oh yes" I replied, not unduly concerned. He then went on to explain about the church newsletter and his idea to print the stories about life in Canada. After a discussion with the clan, who all rather liked the idea of possible celebrity status, we agreed it would be fun!

Rhianne and I, who both love fancy, posh stationary, decided it would be the perfect excuse to go shopping for the requisite posh notebook and pen to record our stories. We have a huge bookshop called "Chapters", handily just up the road. Alongside posh stationary, pens and other accessories for the budding writer, it also has the obligatory coffee shop. After spending a very pleasant hour perusing, we both stood, posh notebook and pen in hand, looked at one another and said,

"So, what are we going to write about?" It was decided that we should introduce ourselves.

We are farmers, who emigrated to Canada in 2008. We live just outside London in Ontario, which is 2 hours southwest of Toronto. Unusually for Canada, where farmers tend to specialize in one enterprise, we have a very mixed operation. We have 1400 acres of crops, consisting of corn (maize in English), soybeans and hay. We fatten cattle, have sheep, 2 pigs (called Doug and Justin), I won't explain their names as it's political, 2 horses and Molly the Border Collie! This operation is run and managed by a team of accomplished family members, The Collinson-Pearson Clan. In short,

Marcus - patriarch, "voice of reason and wisdom", his words not ours! He is the builder/repair man who also helps out in the cattle and sheep when necessary. He also imparts not always appreciated advice!

Dan - is the main crop and equipment guy. He drives all the major machines like the combine and forage harvester as well as seeing to all the equipment maintenance and repairs. He gets very upset with people who lose tools or don't grease their machines!

Chris - is our very astute cattleman. He does all the buying and selling of the cattle as well as overseeing the nutrition and vaccination programmes. Unfortunately for him, it means spending a lot of time standing and dealing with muck!

Andrew - is the newest member of the crew and has a passion, which his wife can't understand, for sheep. He is in the process of setting up a small flock of milking sheep, due to start producing in the new year. He is also a qualified HGV driver so drives our 53' truck/lorry.

Rhianne - has spent her entire life, proclaiming to anyone who

would listen that she is not a farmer and does not enjoy farming. Needless to say, she has now married Andrew, is living on the farm, runs the farm office and sees to all the bookkeeping. She still hasn't worked out how it happened! She describes herself as a "sarcastic putter outer of fires", in other words a problem solver!

Posie - is our adorable granddaughter, who is 7 going on 17! She is full of energy, loves life and keeps us all entertained.

Then there's me, Jayne, Vic's daughter. I like to think of myself as the glue that works very hard to hold everyone together. So, in a nutshell, that's us. ------

Well, there you are folks. I hope that has whet your appetite ready for the next instalment in February.



News from our "Roving Reporters" from around the Circuit

ADVENT D.I.Y. - On Sunday November 28th in Bishop Monkton Methodist Church a congregation of 29 people gathered to celebrate the start of Advent with a Christingle Service led by Linda Blackburn.

The service began with the lighting of the first Advent candle then, suitably masked up, we sang our hymns and said our prayers of confession followed by the gospel readings.

Then instead of receiving a ready-made Christingle and having the meaning of each part of the Christingle explained we each had to make own Christingle during the explanation of the meaning of the Christingle with various elements brought to our pews.

To each of us a ready prepared orange was brought to represent, and remind us, of wholeness of God's world. Then a bright red tape to go round the orange as a recognition of the encompassing nature of God's love for all of us. This was followed by four cocktail sticks, each with a sweet attached, that we positioned evenly round the orange to represent the 'four corners of the earth'. Finally, a candle was fixed into the top of the orange.

At this point the lights in the church were dimmed and the candle on a single Christingle was lit from the first advent candle which then passed its light to a second candle and so the light spread across the church in representation of the 'Love of God' for the whole of the world.

The service then moved on to prayers for all those in need, whether near or far, before we closed with a hymn and blessing.

We all then gathered for a tea/coffee and biscuits, in need of refreshment after both our spiritual and practical efforts.

Worship in Finghall - At our Church Council meeting this November, we were discussing the future of our churches and a revelation, to me at least, from Reverend Gareth was that our Church buildings when built were not meant to last forever. Thinking about this later, I thought I might find out a bit about the Finghall Churches.

The first known mention of Finghall was in AD 788 when a synod was held at the settlement.

For over a thousand years, Christian worship has taken place at the small 12th century Church of St Andrews which is believed to be on the site of a much earlier Anglo-Saxon medieval village that was deserted when affected by a 16th century water borne plague. The villagers moved to higher ground, the current site of Finghall.

St Andrews, now outside the village still serves for Anglican style worship for the area.

The first Wesleyan Methodist Chapel was built in 1845 by the Jaques family, only a small building that is now a holiday let, yet on two occasions in the early 1860's a hundred people crammed in there to hear a charismatic young speaker called Silvester Whitehead. He was born in Aysgarth in 1841 and continued to serve in the Methodist ministry at home and abroad as a missionary and in 1904/1905 was President of the Methodist conference.

The little Chapel continued to serve Finghall as a Sunday school and was used by groups such as the Boy Scouts and Girl guides until 1940.

The current Methodist Church was built in 1909 and the named stones around the base of the building contain the names of those who donated to pay for the building at the time. The building has served us well over time and when the inside was renovated and remodelled it became a place of quiet peace.

Though we have lost Church buildings over the years, many are still standing and serving our communities.

When Gareth made his comment, it brought home the fact that the Church is never a building.

The Church is an assembly of believers in Jesus Christ.

The building facilitates the fellowship, worship, and ministry of God.
